

Guildford Hotel

Most local residents will already have noticed recent activity at the Guildford Hotel, notably the construction of new scaffolding and the recent demolition of the drive-in bottle shop on the south side of the main building.

Structural engineers commissioned by the Heritage Council, and also the City of Swan, had inspected the building before the recent works began. It is understood that the City forwarded its engineer's advice to the owners. As a result, the earlier scaffolding supporting parts of the building was bolstered. It is also understood that the scaffolding recently erected over footpaths was put in place as a result of a work order served on the owners to ensure public safety.

These developments have occurred since a meeting of senior representatives from the Heritage Council and the City late last year, which was requested by the Minister for Heritage, Mr John Castrilli. Several local residents, including the presidents of the Guildford Association and the Swan-Guildford Historical Society, have met twice with Mr Scott Hollingworth from the City of Swan, who has explained that he is in close communication with both the owners and senior staff from the Heritage Council.

Those at the first meeting with Mr Holllingworth were heartened to learn that the dispute over insurance has been resolved and that the owners are now developing plans for the Hotel. Subsequently, further meetings have been held with senior officials within the Heritage Council, including the Executive Director, Mr Graeme Gammie. Ongoing follow-up from these meetings is continuing.

In early November, the group had also written to the Minister for Heritage, expressing concern about the passage of time and the need to arrange weather protection for the building. In an encouraging response at that stage, Mr Castrilli indicated that he also had some concerns and that he was taking a close interest in the matter.

Several reports of the owner's intentions for the building have been reported recently in the media, including the Sunday Times, the PerthNow website, The Echc and the Midland Reporter. Residents are encouraged to refer to these sources for details, however it is understood that the owners are yet to submit a redevelopment proposal to the City of Swan.

With autumn now well established, there is widespread agreement that the current priority is to ensure that the building's walls and basement footings are protected from risk of further structural damage from water and damp. Although the onset o winter rains is now only a few weeks away, those who have been in contact with State and Local Government officials are heartened by recent developments, particularly the positive news about the insurance payout and the owners' awareness that it is in their interests to protect what remains of the hotel.
