Guildford Hotel

On 31 August 2013, it was five years since this significant heritage listed building, and iconic landmark was badly damaged by fire. The landowners are currently considering expressions of interest from several companies interested in leasing the hotel if it is restored. It is not known how much longer this will take or whether a firm commitment will be made.

In the meantime, the hotel is subject to our un-seasonally wet spring weather and storms. It is a credit to this building (and the craftsmen who built it) that it has withstood the neglect so far. But for how much longer?

Lynwood House in Middle Swan

Sadly this State heritage listed house now only exists in photographs and our memories. The City of Swan approved an application by the land owners for demolition and Albert Jacob, the Minister for Heritage, refused to intervene. The building had been allowed to fall into disrepair and neither the State Heritage Office, the Minister for Heritage or the City of Swan sought verification of the landowners' quote to restore it.

It is a sorry state of affairs when the very agencies which should be protecting our heritage are abetting the destruction of it. The short-sightedness of this approach means that Western Australia will never have buildings that get to 1,000 years old if we cannot even retain buildings that are less than 120 years old. In the United Kingdom, Europe and more recently in the United States, heritage buildings and places are greatly valued from an economic and tourism point of view.

Our buildings tell us who we are as a nation. They tell us much about the environment, climate, lifestyle and social and economic structure of past generations. Our future is determined having regard to the past.

Review of Heritage Legislation

The Association has also recently received advice from the Minister for Heritage that there is no timeline on the urgently needed revamp of the *Heritage of Western Australia Act*. The review of this legislation was prompted by a petition submitted to Parliament in 2009 by the then Shadow Minister for Heritage, John Hyde. Despite a commitment by the former Minister for Heritage John Castrilli that the legislation would proceed in 2012, the State Government is now dragging its feet.

Our local Magpies

The Australian Magpie (Cracticus tibicen) is a robust black and white bird native to Australia and southern New Guinea. They are omnivorous with the bulk of their diet made up of grasshoppers, beetle, moths, slaters, worms and other delicious small crawlies. Our local birds are being studied which is why you see bands on their legs. The bands contain information about individual birds including their gender and home territory. Magpies are gregarious and curious birds and are distinctive by the sound of their carolling. They are also very protective of their young and it is the male birds that swoop if you get too close to their nests in spring. Protect yourself by wearing a sturdy hat and glasses or wave your arms around. Magpies are a protected native bird under the *Wildlife Act 1975*.

Garrick Theatre
